- 6. If you are unfortunate enough to land in an organization full of slackers (they exist in abundance), they will drive you out, and in so doing actually do you a favor.

The world of employment is full of slackers.

It is not like college.

It is like high school or middle school.

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- 3. Now, when you do calculations or research for a project, *the consequence of bad work is far worse than just getting a bad grade*—they can cost your employer real money and, if serious enough, can cause real safety issues endangering human beings, which can cost your employer catastrophic sums.

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- 4. Although a corporation is a pile of legal documents, you will always be dealing with human beings. They may act as agents of a corporation, but they still have their own experiences, education and prejudices that they drag along.

I am going to be thinking of these things as I interview you. If you want a job with me, you will demonstrate that you know about them, too.

You will be better prepared if you drop the word "Interview" from your vocabulary and think "Audition"

NEW SUBJECT

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- I am tough and expect you to be the same
- I do not care what your hobbies or extracurricular activities are unless you can show me how they will help make you a better employee
- I expect you to know little despite what you may think you know
- I view employees as a necessary evil and have no social conscience reason for hiring you

But most of all assume...

I expect all candidates from your school to be of high academic caliber. I am using the AUDITION process to determine your other important qualities, good and bad, that will help me make a decision on hiring or not hiring you specifically. These are things like energy, honesty, motivation, commitment, passion and so forth. *These* are what an AUDITION is really about.

I am AUDITIONING you

If you show up late, you better be dead.

Come a day ahead of time. Drive around, know the facility, the town and my company's role in it. You will for sure be on time and have an understanding of how my facility fits into the immediate community.

And I can deny hiring you for any reason of the previous twelve without ever running afoul of labor employment laws any place in the United States

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- Confirm your audition a day ahead of schedule including verification of exact place and time you are supposed to appear

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- Confirm your audition a day ahead of schedule including verification of exact place and time you are supposed to appear
- Bring transcript, notepad, writing instrument

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An audition meal's purpose is not to feed you—it is to see how you behave in such a setting—it is an AUDITION. Do not be high maintenance—I don't care if your steak was marinated in Listerine®, politely eat a moderate portion anyway and with a smile on your face.

- If I take you out to eat, being of impeccable manners and eating lightly
- Adroitly link your personal experience to ways you will be able to help my company

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- Adroitly link your personal experience to ways you will be able to help my company
 By "help my company" I mean make the invoice printer spin—the only reason my company employs anyone.

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- Show an understanding of the concept that I expect to earn a decent return on employing you

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After all, why would anyone hire someone to break even on them?

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- Show respect to everyone you meet at my facility, regardless of their position
 - After all, if they have a job with me, they are making the invoice printer spin and I am making a return on employing them—you should be so lucky.

- Memorize the names and positions of everyone you meet on your day long interview at my facility and bring up one or two of them in the closing interview
- Show respect to everyone you meet at my facility, regardless of their position
- Recognize my safety rules if I tour you through the facility, and, if in doubt ask about them

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- Call me or my assistant the day after the audition and ask if you can provide any follow-up documentation

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- Call me or my assistant the day after the interview and ask if you can provide any followup documentation
- Send a second thank you note (with different wording) one week after the audition

Do these, and you may have a chance of receiving an offer, but more importantly...
